Online nomination	Students need to be nominated by their home university coordinator via our online nomination form before they can start their application. We kindly request you not to nominate outside of the designated nomination periods mentioned above. Nomination instructions will be shared separately to this document.
Online application and admission	Once their nomination has been approved, students will receive Leiden University account details, (ULCN) and will be invited to submit their application via our online application portal uSis.
	After completing their personal details and submitting supporting documents, students are prompted to submit course requests in our online application portal. Once an application is complete, if the student meets the admission criteria, course requests are forwarded to the faculties for evaluation. A student must be admitted to several specific courses of min. 15 ECTS before an offer of admission can be extended. We recommend that students not book flights or make other travel plans before receiving their offer of admission. In addition to their desired courses, students should also select max. 3 alternative courses in case their first choices are not all approved.

Website for international students	This website with information on life in the Netherlands and practical matters such as Visa, Housing and Financial Matters will help students prepare their stay.
Housing	Like many universities in the Netherlands, Leiden University does not have a central campus or student dormitories. Instead, our faculties are spread throughout the cities of Leiden and The Hague and students live in accommodation rented via housing organisations and landlords. In general, students are expected to arrange their own housing. We advise prospective students to start to explore ways of finding accommodation well before arriving in the Netherlands to begin their studies.
	Each year, Leiden University reserves a limited number of rooms via housing agency DUWO for new international students, but due to high demand and limited availability, Leiden University cannot guarantee accommodation to all applicants.
	Prospective students are thus advised to apply for housing in a very early stage, and to pay the housing application fee (€285) as early as possible after application, and well before the housing application deadline of June 1st for the Fall semester and November 15th for the Spring semester. An application for housing can be submitted via the application portal as soon as their application for admission has been submitted. There is no need to await a decision on their application for admission to Leiden University. Once a student has reserved accommodation via University Housing, the housing agency DUWO further coordinates the process.
	Housing through Leiden University cannot be guaranteed, we insist that students also seek housing via other routes. If a student needs to find housing independently Leiden University can give <u>advice and tips</u> . Please be informed that private housing can be expensive and is scarce.
Visa and residence permits	Holders of EU/EEA passports do not require a residence permit to study at Leiden University. Students with a non-EU nationality must have a residence permit and in many cases an entry visa as well. Once a student has been admitted to Leiden University, the International Relations Office will work with the student to apply on their behalf. Students should note that there is a fee of €228 for visas/permits (this fee is subject to change annually) and strict deadlines for submission of documents.
Insurance	All students are obliged to have health insurance to cover any medical costs incurred during their stay. We strongly recommend that students ensure they have medical insurance before their arrival. Students are also highly recommended to take out liability insurance to cover any accidental damage caused to other persons or property.

Application and admission

Exchange

If you are currently enrolled at one of Leiden University's partner institutions, you can apply for an exchange semester or year in Leiden. This has the advantage that you will only pay tuition fees at your home university. Leiden University participates in the Erasmus+ programme and the International Student Exchange Programs (ISEP). In addition, we have bilateral agreements with over 70 distinguished partner institutions. Leiden University currently offers exchange opportunities in nearly 20 fields. We recommend that you contact the exchange or study abroad coordinator at your home institution to determine whether you are eligible to participate in an exchange programme.

Study Abroad

If there is no exchange agreement between Leiden University and your home institution, you have the option to apply for a Study Abroad programme for one or two semesters instead. Admission as a study abroad or exchange student is based on a number of factors. In general, you must have completed at least two years of university education, have a GPA of at least 3.2 out of 4.0 (or equivalent) and your academic background must be relevant to the courses you are applying for. You may also have to submit English language test results. The minimum test scores required are 90 (TOEFL) or 6.5 (IELTS Academic). Please consult your exchange or study abroad coordinator and our exchange website for details on the application procedure and admission requirements.
